CPB Seminar: The mechanics and evolution of cell division 7 October, 2pm

Living systems propagate by undergoing rounds of cell growth and division. In fact, all modern day organisms are the progeny of a single cell that divided over 3.5 billion years ago. In this talk, by looking at features of the cell division machinery that we (eukaryotes) share with our cellular relatives, the archaea, they will attempt to shed light on the origins of our cell division machinery. By studying, experimentally and numerically, cell division in Sulfolobus, a member of the TACK/Asgard archaea, they will ask whether it is possible to use these relatively simple organisms to reveal fundamental physical features of the process of cell division that are hard to discern in our cells because of their relative complexity.
