The Vice-Chancellor's Awards for Impact 2016 New Award

The Vice-Chancellor's inaugural Awards for Impact have been launched to recognise and reward researchers at all stages of their careers whose research has led to excellent impact outside academia. Their aim is to highlight the range and quality of impact arising from Cambridge research, and they actively encourage nominations from all six Schools at the University. Applications will initially be judged by each of the six Schools of the University, with a prize of £1,000 being awarded to the best impact in each School. The overall best impact award will be selected from these winners, and awarded with a prize of £2,000. The Award is open to researchers, postgraduate research students and staff at the University of Cambridge.
