Cambridge Postdoc Enterprise Competition

This <u>EPOC competition</u> is being held in conjunction with the 'Start-up skills workshop for PostDocs' (details below).

This business plan contest offers the chance for University postdocs to win early funding for their business ideas, with awards of £20k and £10k for the two winners. Charlie Bayne Travel Trust

The Trust offers travel grants to undergraduate and postgraduate students with a disability in Cambridge, at the University or Anglia Ruskin University. The Trust is intended to assist students who face **extra costs** in travelling as a result of their disability. Grants will normally be up to £500 per person, and will be awarded according to the merit and cost-effectiveness of the applications (rather than their size). Disabled students who are wheelchair users should be the principal beneficiaries; but the fund is open to all students with physical disabilities including those with sensory impairments. 
Mentoring session with Gina Warren (Equality & Diversity Consultant).

Mediation Service

Mediation is a well-established process for resolving disagreements in which an impartial third party (the mediator) helps two or more people in dispute to attempt to reach an agreement and find a mutually acceptable resolution. The University's <u>Mediation Service</u> uses co-mediation which involves the allocation of two mediators per case. Mediators are members of staff, drawn from a variety of backgrounds and roles throughout the University who, as



volunteers, have received training in mediation skills in order to assist with the resolution of difficulties between individual members of staff.
