- Stephen Hawking has received a Life Time Achievement award at this year's Pride of Britain Awards, which took place on Monday 31st October. His award was presented by Prime Minister Theresa May in a ceremony at London's Grosvenor Hotel.

- Prof. David J. Thouless, an Assistant Lecturer (1961-63) and then Lecturer (1963-64) in DAMTP has been awarded one half of the <u>2016 Nobel Prize in Physics</u>, 'for theoretical discoveries of topological phase transitions and topological phases of matter'. The other half of the Nobel Prize has been awarded jointly to Prof. F. Duncan M. Haldane and Prof. J. Michael Kosterlitz, who along with David Thouless are all former members of the TCM Group in the Cavendish Laboratory.

OTHER NEWS

The <u>Cantab Capital Institute for Mathematics of</u> <u>Information</u> (CCIMI) celebrated the naming of Pavilion F, as well as the academic launch of the centre on Thursday 10th November. The new signage for the pavilion was unveiled by Ewan Kirk, cofounder and chief investment officer of <u>Cantab</u>, and Carola Schönlieb, CCIMI Director.

The afternoon continued with a series of academic talks from Carola Schönlieb, Tim Gowers and Richard Samworth, followed by a poster session during which the CCIMI students presented the plans for their PhD projects alongside a large variety of ongoing work



related to the centre, and finished with a very entertaining presentation from David Spiegelhalter. This was followed by dinner in the central core at CMS, during which Stephen Hawking gave a pre-dinner speech, alongside a few words from Matt Killeya, Head of Research at Cantab. The event was a huge success, and it was fantastic to have presentations from so many of Cambridge's eminent mathematicians, highlighting the value of CMS and the work done here, particularly that relating to mathematics of information. Funders' Collection Period 2017 REMINDER

In preparation for the forthcoming *funders' collection period* between Friday 6th February and Thursday 16th March 2017, the University of Cambridge is taking part in a pilot project to help its researchers (including students) by providing an automatic upload facility from <u>Symplectic Element</u>s to Researchfish. Researchers who hold awards from RCUK, CRUK, NC3Rs and NIHR are encouraged to link their publications to their grants within Symplectic Elements by Friday 18th November 2016 so that the outputs will automatically upload into Researchfish. There will be a second upload from Symplectic Elements to Researchfish taking place early January 2017, when any subsequently linked data will be uploaded. Challenging Conversations Spaces still available


Wednesday 16th November at 12noon–1.00pm in 213 Committee Room, Department of Physics, Cavendish Laboratory.
