The Department would like to extend their congratulations to *Philip Dawid FRS*, Emeritus Professor of Statistics, on being appointed as a new Royal Society fellow. Philip has made fundamental contributions to both the philosophical underpinnings and the practical applications of Statistics. His theory of conditional independence is a keystone of modern statistical theory and methods, and he has demonstrated its usefulness in a host of applications, including computation in probabilistic expert systems, causal inference, and forensic identification. His co-authored book Probabilistic Networks and Expert Systems won the first DeGroot Prize for a published book in Statistical Science, and he was awarded the Royal Statistical Society's Guy Medal in Silver in 2001.

David Spiegelhalter has <u>commented on a new study</u> suggesting that life satisfaction increases if a nation takes part in Eurovision.

ICSU Global Gender Gap in Science survey

The Global Survey of Mathematical, Computing, and Natural Scientists is being run by the International Council for Science and is now open until Wednesday 31st October 2018.
