# Changes to Research Grant application deadlines POSTDOCS & ACADEMIC STAFF

The changes relating to the submission of research grant applications aim to simplify the process for submitting research grant applications through the Research Operations Office (ROO) and include:

1. Two-step checking service available until 7 working days prior to the funder submission deadline which will provide all financial checks and allow changes to the non-financial aspects of the proposals until 1 working day before the funder submission deadline.

#### Alternatively, if this is not met:

A final deadline for the entire application of 5 working days prior to the funder submission deadline for all Standard Applications and Open Calls.

- 2. That applications received after the ROO deadlines will **not** be submitted.
- 3. Raising the threshold for Small Applications to £250,000 fEC.
- This change will be implemented on Monday 1<sup>st</sup> October 2018. What this will mean in practice is that the new deadline rules will come into force for funder deadlines that fall on the **Wednesday 10<sup>th</sup> October 2018** onwards.

# Postdoc Calendar Michaelmas Term



# Supervision and Teaching Training (Maths Specific) STUDENTS

All research students have the opportunity to give supervisions (small group teaching) to undergraduates. This is normally arranged through Colleges, and can be a useful supplement to income. There is no requirement whatsoever to supervise, and students rarely do more than 3-4 hours per week. Even if you do not wish to supervise, it is an important as part of your training to learn the skills required. *We therefore expect all new graduate students to attend one of the sessions below.* Note that attending supervisions as an undergraduate is not a substitute for attending supervision training.

The Faculty, in conjunction with the School Researcher Developer, offers four supervision training opportunities each year. These sessions provide teaching skills for supervising Mathematics and Mathematics in the Natural Sciences. The sessions are supported by Faculty materials/resources on how to conduct supervisions in Mathematics. All prospective supervisors are required to attend a training session prior to taking on supervision responsibilities. The training is open to anyone planning to supervise mathematics students for the first time.

## CMS Facilities Team – Summer projects report

This summer CMS Facilities have had one of its busiest years, hiring many of its lecture rooms and even a proportion of the car park to external organisations, generating an income of £15k. As the site is now 16 - 18 years old some items are starting to suffer from wear and tear, and that money along with significant reserves has helped to fund many maintenance projects this summer.

In addition Estate Management have continued to fund and oversee the completion of:

- the change from the vulnerable Siemens BMS system to Trend, completing a one year project to upgrade Pavilion B
- the replacement lighting controls project in Pavilion E, in order to provide lighting control spares for the rest of the site for several years to come.

#### **Carpet fitting at CMS**

This summer B1.19 Common Room (*right*), MR3, parts of the library staircase, seven lift cabs and twenty eight offices have been re-carpeted with the original high specification carpet and underlay. We have kept any joins to a minimum and taken the opportunity to deep clean all of those offices.



#### **Central Core**

All of the wooden window sills have been sanded

and re-varnished, and all the low level leather chairs have had the underneath of the seat pads refurbished, as the fabric had started to crumble. Unfortunately the roof still leaks, albeit to a lesser extent than in the past, and there will be some further maintenance work in the coming weeks to replace the silicone joints.

# MR2 - new HDMI Laser data projector and audio

MR2 is now back at the forefront of AV with a new 6500 lumens laser data projector taking an HDMI signal. Two lanyard and two handheld microphones are available. This work has been supported the Central Facilities AV team and fund matched by The School.

#### Lecture Room signage

Additional signage has been added to many of the lecture rooms with some further signs planned.

#### MR3, MR4 and MR5

125 lecture room chairs have been re-upholstered in MR4 and MR5, and MR3, MR4 and MR5 have also been redecorated with the original colour scheme.

#### **CMS Pool bikes**

Owing to the success of the scheme another pool bike has been purchased, so CMS now has three unisex hybrid pool bikes (2 x large & 1 x medium frame). CMS also have a spare bike lock which can be borrowed if ever needed.
