DAMTP:

Stephen Hawking's final book, Brief Answers to the Big Questions, will be launched this week.

A study co-authored by *Colm-cille Caulfield* (DAMTP) and Paolo Luzzatto-Fegiz (UC Santa Barbara), which looks at how to develop ways to improve windfarm productivity, is featured in Phys.Org.

The Guardian has recently reported on the publication of <u>Stephen Hawking's final paper</u> 'Black Hole Entropy and Soft Hair', which was co-authored by Malcolm Perry and Sasha Haco.

Congratulations to *Jacob Smith* who has won an Early Career Researcher Prize at the SPARC (Stratosphere-troposphere Processes And their Role in Climate) General Assembly in Kyoto, which took place in early October. He was awarded the prize for his poster: *'Causes of stratospheric water vapour variability in reanalysis and UKCA chemistry climate model*'. The Prizes were sponsored by Project Loon, which is working on providing high-speed internet access to remote areas across the world using a network of stratospheric balloons. Jacob's PhD research is supported by a NERC Industrial CASE project with the UK Met Office supervised by *Peter Haynes* (DAMTP), Amanda Maycock (Leeds) and Andrew Bushell and Neal Butchart (UK Met Office).

On 19th September *Peter Wadhams* gave the keynote address at the Peace BAR Festival at Kyung Hee University, Seoul, celebrating the 37th anniversary of the UN International Day of Peace. The address was on 'The Crisis of the Earth and the Future of Humanity'. At the same time the Korean edition of his book, 'A Farewell to Ice', was published by Kyung Hee University; this is the seventh foreign language edition.

The Prizes are open to:

- (a) any member of the University, if at the latest date for the submission of essays at least three but not more than five, complete terms have passed since the term of his or her admission as a Graduate Student; or
- (b) any Bachelor of Arts of the University who is not a Graduate Student of the University if, at the latest date for the submission of essays, at least three, but not more than five complete terms have passed since he or she last obtained Honours Examination or was approved for the M.Phil. Degree or for a Diploma.

The purpose of the Prize competition is to encourage beginning researchers in mathematics in their conduct and write-up of new and original work.
