Professor Mihaela van der Schaar (Public Health and Primary Care and Department Applied Mathematics and Theoretical Physics - Plummer Professor of Machine Learning, Artificial Intelligence and Medicine and a Turing Fellow), is the female AI researcher based in the UK with the most publications in this field (Nesta report https://cam.us6.list-manage.com/track/click?u=cedd723ab1e1b8356d979a4d8&id=44f44a50f6&e=0637855841). Mihaela leads the effort on data science and machine learning for personalised medicine and has been working in AI for over 16 years, with her presence in the field and much of her early work only been recognised recently.

India's second spacecraft to the moon - Chandrayaan-2, an unprecedented attempt to soft-land on the lunar south pole, successfully launched on July 22, 2019. The DAMTP atomic astrophysics group, led by G. Del Zanna, is looking forward to the science exploitation of one of the instruments (XSM, built by PRL), thanks to a grant from the Royal Society.

Prof Peter Wadhams played a major role in the film "Ice on Fire", produced and narrated by Leonardo DiCaprio, which had its premier at the Cannes Film Festival and was released in June 2019. The film deals with climate change and, in particular, with the threat from Arctic methane and the possibilities of climate restoration through direct air capture of CO2.

Run Leaders Course - University of Cambridge 23 September

Following the success of the course ran in Easter 2019, the Sports Service is organising another Leadership in Running Fitness course on Monday 23 Sept 2019. Their aim is to develop a network of running groups for University and College Staff led by trained Run Leaders.



Run leaders are trained and insured by England Athletics,

the National Governing Body (NGB) for athletics and running. The course will enable leaders to deliver fun and safe sessions to groups with mixed ability, including how to support new runners as well as developing pathways for those that want to progress. It focuses on understanding and overcoming barriers to participation in running and how to increase participation by those not traditionally attracted to a running club.

The Sports Service will contribute the following:

- Organise and host the course at the University Sports Centre.
- Provide a mentor that will be able to give ongoing support and advice to Run Leaders.
- Tool kits and resources for Leaders which will include everything from getting the group started to keeping the groups engaged.


