NRICH

In response to school closures due to the COVID-19 pandemic, NRICH are actively working to support home educating school students - and their parents/carers - and teachers working remotely. There has been a surge in use of our online mathematics education resources: in particular, the NRICH website (<u>https://nrich.maths.org</u>) is currently attracting around 1.25 million page views a week.

NRICH resources cover all stages of Early Years, primary and secondary education for ages 3 to 19, focusing on developing mathematical thinking and transferable problem-solving skills. The entire NRICH site is freely accessible and actively being used, and they have also been working to create emergency packages of resources to support independent learning.

At the start of April an urgent call went out to the scientific modelling community to help the fight against the COVID-19 pandemic. The call is being coordinated by the Royal Society and led by a small group of academics including DAMTP's Mike Cates and Julia Gog. Read <u>here</u> for more information.



Mihaela van der Schaar's research team has partnered with NHS Digital to help hospitals in England respond to the COVID-19 pandemic. Four NHS trusts, including Cambridge University Hospitals, will trial a machine learning model designed to predict demand for scarce resources like ventilators and ICU beds. Following the initial trial phase, the model could be rolled out further across England's healthcare system.

"Professor van der Schaar's lab at the University of Cambridge is recognised as the UK's and possibly the world's leading team creating new methods in machine learning applied to address real-world medical problems," says Dr Jem Rashbass, Executive Director for Master Registries and Data at NHS Digital. "We recognised that there was an opportunity to industrialise the methods and deploy this as a service through the national infrastructure managed by NHSD and deliver a real data-driven planning tool to hospitals."
